

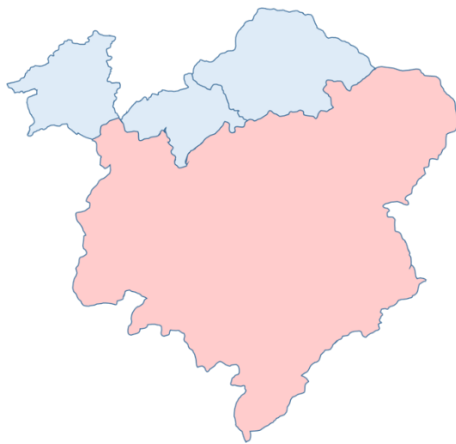

Community Update - Kelso & District

PC Tait-Logan has been busy at the schools in Kelso throughout the month of October. She has attended assemblies at Kelso High School with year's 1-6 where she addressed various subjects that have been affecting our community in recent times including anti-social behaviour at the Skate Park and in the community in general away from School. These assemblies were based around respect in the community. There has also been an increase in reports of low level theft from the Co-Op at High Croft, Kelso with many being attributed to juveniles. PC Tait-Logan has raised this issue with pupils at the school assemblies as well as dealing with the reported incidents.

PC Tait-Logan has also attended at the Primary Schools in Kelso and given inputs on Internet Safety and "People Who Help us" and carried out a station visit at Kelso Police Station with a vulnerable child.

Parking issues in the town continue to be reported by members of the Public. Although parking is primarily dealt with by the Community Action Team officers, local response officers have also been made aware of the problem areas that have been raised this month for joint approach.

Protecting Vulnerable People in a Physical & Digital World



In October 2024 Police in the Scottish Borders attended and were involved with around 207 mental health related calls, around 18 missing person enquiries and approximately 91 domestic related incidents.

Kelso & District had 23 mental health related calls and 1 missing person enquiry. Due to GDPR and protection of victims/subjects involved, we are unable to share any more specific information in relation to these type of call within this report.

Police Scotland work in collaboration with key partners to assist the most vulnerable within the communities and to provide support.

Reducing violence and ASB

Assault

Tackling serious and organised crime

Serious and organised crime enforcement – September 2024

The Scottish Borders CID Proactive Unit executed 6 Drug Warrants across the command area during September, all except one were positive and a variety of MDA charges were proffered against 5 persons. Heroin, cocaine, benzodiazepines and cannabis were all recovered during these searches in addition to large sums of cash and suspected stolen property.

They also assisted other CID departments in the area with stolen property warrants for housebreakings across the Scottish Borders.

They would like to re-enforce the message to all wards that any drug related crime or organised criminality in the Scottish Borders can be anonymously reported via CrimeStoppers, who are an independent charity not connected to the Police. The public can of course still use 101 for this purpose too.

Serious and organised crime enforcement – October 2024

The Scottish Borders CID Proactive Unit executed 4 Drug Warrants across the command area during October, four were positive and 4 persons were charged with drug related offences. A number of stop and searches were also conducted in identified hotspot area where drugs misuse was prevalent across the Scottish Borders.

Serious and organised crime impacts local communities across the Borders and anyone with information on criminal activity are asked to contact Police Scotland on 101, report it at any Police Station or report it anonymously via the Crime Stoppers Charity. This information can be on any criminal matter but includes an individuals unexplained financial gain or wealth or persons who are vulnerable in our communities and being targeted or exploited by others for any reason.

Campaigns

Hate Crime Awareness Week – 12th to 19th October

Hate Crime in all its forms is unacceptable and that is why Police Scotland is raising awareness of the impact hate crime has on officers and staff and, in turn, the communities they serve.

Black History Month 2024



Police Scotland has teamed up with our friends and colleagues at SEMPER Scotland (Supporting Ethnic Minority Police employees for Equality in Race) to celebrate Black History Month.

For Police Scotland, Black History Month is a chance to celebrate the enormous value and contribution Black and Minority Ethnic citizens bring to communities of geography and interests across Scotland and to policing in Scotland.

This year Police Scotland and SEMPER continue to celebrate Black History month under the banner of Proud to Be, sharing contributions from our colleagues across a series of events on their achievements, pride in their culture and what the month means to them personally and as police officers and staff.

Black History Month is a celebration, but it is also an opportunity to highlight the action Police Scotland and the SPA is taking, and the further work required, to drive an anti-racist, anti-discriminatory agenda, as we seek to address complex and insidious wrongs which have deep roots through history and which persist today.

Policing Together is driving an anti-racist agenda to identify and eliminate the biases in practices and policies and to build a better service.

We are actively listening to under-represented communities, inside policing and across Scotland, to understand how we can better serve them.

Police Scotland is committed to increasing knowledge and learning on inclusion and has given every police leader the skills and tools they need to build effective and inclusive teams.

The success of this action will be measured by the improved experiences of our officers and staff, and of all the communities we serve.

CAT Update:

ROAD SAFETY – SBCAT have continued carrying out road checks in numerous locations in the Scottish Borders and have dealt with 11 traffic offences this month.

SBCAT stopped a car in Galashiels which they recognised as having recently driven off without paying for fuel. Following checks they established that the car had no insurance and the vehicle was seized. The driver was charged with driving with no insurance and theft of fuel.

In late October SBCAT became aware of a vehicle driving erratically in Jedburgh. Upon speaking to the driver he failed the drug swipe test and was arrested for drug driving. Samples will be sent away for analysis prior to a report being submitted to the Procurator Fiscal.

Speed checks have been completed in several towns near to schools along with villages including, Chirnside Coldingham and Ayton.

PARKING TICKETS – Officers have been carrying out high visibility enforcement across the Borders and addressing parking concerns there. Advice has been given to drivers and 50 tickets have been issued.

Passing attention was given to Galashiels, Selkirk, Hawick, Kelso, Duns and Peebles.

RURAL ACQUISITIVE CRIME – We carry out high visibility mobile patrols across rural areas at varying times while completing static road checks. A total of 24 static road checks were completed during October

On the afternoon of Sunday 27th of October, 4 CAT officers were deployed to Monynut, with 2 officers on quadbikes and 2 more in a 4x4 vehicle. Off road motorbikes were seen but they made off from police, further checks appeared to show that they had left the area.

ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR – High visibility patrols have continued in targeted areas of the Scottish Borders to address concerns highlighted as per our taskings. This includes outside Jedburgh Sheriff Court on Monday court days.

Considerable attention has been given across Burnfoot, especially around the shops and the primary school. There are still ongoing issues with off road motorcycles and youth ASB. Extra Community and CAT patrols will continue

PROTECTING VULNERABLE PEOPLE – Part of the SBCAT role is to trace persons wanted on warrant/missing person/and bail curfew checks. The SBCAT has also assisted with high-risk domestic enquiry packs and have traced one male wanted for domestic offences this month.

On Halloween the CAT were out conducting youth patrols as part of Operation Torsion. They attended Newtown St Boswells for a ASB youth call. Following enquiries they established that a teenage girl had been assaulted. A male has been charged with a minor assault.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT – On the 18th October the SBCAT and Proactive Crime Team (PCT) executed a drugs search warrant in Selkirk. 30g of white powder was seized which will be sent for analysis alongside some controlled tablets.

On 30th October the SBCAT assisted the PCT with executing a drugs search warrant in Galashiels. Some weapons were recovered but no drugs.

OTHER ISSUES OF NOTE-

On the 11th of November PC Bernard Hennessey is leaving the SBCAT to go to the CID. On the same date PC Connor Flockhart will be joining the SBCAT.
